AN ORDINANCE AMENDING PLANNED DEVELOPMENT ORDINANCE #0-71-75 855 N. STERLING AVENUE

WHEREAS, upon petition of owners of said property, a public hearing was held by the Plan Commission on August 18, 2015 in accordance with the Zoning Ordinance of the Village of Palatine, in such case made and provided, and said Plan Commission having made its findings in a report to the Mayor and Village Council of the Village of Palatine regarding a request for a Planned Development Amendment to allow a charitable office to provide services to the disabled, on the following legally described property:

Parcel 1: The South 228.80 feet of Lot 2 in Countryside Commercial Area, being a subdivision of part of Section 9, Township 42 North, Range 10 East of the Third Principal Meridian, according to plat thereof registered in the Office of the Register of Titles of Cook County, Illinois on March 8, 1972 as Document 2611595 in Cook County, Illinois.

commonly known as 855 N. Sterling Avenue (F/N # 02-09-402-046)

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Mayor and Village Council of the Village of Palatine, Illinois acting in the exercise of their home rule power:

SECTION 1: That a Planned Development Amendment to allow a charitable office to provide services to the disabled, is hereby granted, subject to the following condition(s):

- 1. The proposed use shall substantially conform to the business/ operations' plan and proposed floorplan, except as such may be changed to conform with Village Codes and Ordinances.
- 2. A Chapter 34 review shall be completed in a manner acceptable to the Director of Fire Prevention.

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3. Based upon the results of the Chapter 34 review, the maximum occupancy will be established in a manner acceptable to the Director of Fire Prevention.

SECTION 2: The petition, a copy of the public notice and minutes of the Plan Commission are attached hereto and form a part hereof.

SECTION 3: This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after is passage and approval as provided by law.

As you are aware, The Wheat Mission In Chicago (Wheat Mission) is requesting an Amendment to the Count vside Mall Planned Development to allow the use of 855 N. Sterling Ave as its administrative offices and as a facility to provide social, spiritual and vocational services and activities for developmentally disabled individuals (including children, teens and adults) and their families. The specific categories of uses in the building will include:

- 1, Offices/ Administrative Spaces for one by the mission staff which currently consists of the pastor. An administrative assistant and possibly an additional administrator are expected users of this office area. Offices for use by volunteers assisting in programming are also anticipated.
- 2. Meeting/Training rooms for use in: conducting group meetings with developmentally disabled individuals; conducting arts/crafts classes; holding discussions and activities to foster social and spiritual grown in these individuals; and conducting meetings to assist the individuals and their families to learn how to obtain needed services and counseling. The rooms will also be used for training volunteers and for providing a forum for families to discuss the challenges they face.
- 3. General open area for use in performing light physical activities and socializing outside of the more structured meeting rooms.

The Wheat Mission is currently located at the Northwest Presbyterian Church, 301 Ridge Avenue, Elk Grove Village, IL 60007. At this time, the Wheat Mission conducts a Saturday School from 10:00 a.m. until 2:30 p.m. each Saturday for 15-20 developmentally disabled individuals. The participants are dropped off by their families between 9:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. and are picked up between 2:30 p.m. and 3:00 p.m. There are also about 25 volunteers who come to assist with these activities. About 13 of

the volunteers are dropped off and some of the others come as a group. There are currently 10 cars that park in the lot during this time. It is not anticipated that this number will change. There is also a Tuesday evening members meeting that involving 6 to 7 individuals. There are currently 5 cars that park in the lot during this time.

The Wheat Mission anticipates adding an after school program for the benefit of developmentally disabled students and their families. This would be up to three days a week and would involve numbers of individuals similar to those involved in the Tuesday evening meetings. Thave an,

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



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



 855 N. Sterling Drive 1. Planned Development Amendment to allow a charitable office to provide services to the disabled. - Recommended to Approve

Notice was published in the Daily Herald on August 3, 2015, and mailed to the owners of surrounding properties.

The petitioner's representative, James Lennon, introduced others: Gregory Geslicki, architect; Okher Choi, board member, and Rev. Sungwoo Nam, President of the Wheat Mission in Chicago. The Wheat Mission is a non-profit that's been operating since 1979 and has been located in Elk Grove for the last four years. Its purpose originally was to educate the public about people with mental and physical disabilities and now to make life better for them. The second purpose is to reach out to individuals in need and their families and to interact with them and the community, and to provide services. The Wheat Mission is primarily involved with Korean families. They are here tonight to request an amendment to the existing PUD for offices to allow use of the building by the Mission. In addition to offices, classrooms and meeting rooms will be used for training and social interaction. The offices will be the corporate office for the for the Mission and will house the pastor, plus 1 other full time employee and 2 part time employees. There will also be a space designated for volunteer activities to use as a home base. Group activities will be held, sharing information, doing arts and craft, discussions, socialization. The general area will be used for socialization and some physical activities. The primary function of the Wheat Mission was included in a letter, stating there has been no impact on the neighbors.

The major activity is held on Saturdays, "Saturday School" for individuals who interact with 20 + volunteers. The clients are dropped off, some are children and some are adults with special needs. There is involvement with the clients and high school volunteers and adult volunteers. The activity operates 10:30 to 2:30, with one on one socialization and is a well run and highly impactful activity. This activity involves 10 cars, many of the high school volunteers are dropped off or come as a group. They do require 3 parents to stay for Saturday School, to keep them involved, they will be rotating parents.

The other activity is Tuesday evening, for a members meeting, which involves

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about 10 people, so about 5 cars will be parking. Their short term plan will be to add another evening activity, 6 to 9.

There is food involved in Saturday School, which is brought in from churches and agencies, there will be no cooking on site. The kitchen sink would be used for washing up, but there will be no food preparation.

Mr. Lennon gave a history of the building, as an anchor tenant of a restaurant and bar, then a banquet hall, then the New Life Church, a Korean church. This requested use is not a dramatic change.

He noted that the building is located behind another building off Northwest Highway, that there will not be a lot of traffic for this use. The Wheat Mission will take good care of the building.

Changes to the building include a ramp for accessibility, no changes to the structure inside.

Mr. Hanson asked if the clients will be outside; no, these are inside activities only. Reverend Nam concurred. There may be future activities off site. Mr. Hanson asked if this will be a tax exempt use; yes, they plan to apply to Cook County.

Architect Gregory Geslicki of OCGG Architects, reviewed the building's design and how it will work wall for this proposed use. There would be few modifications, a few walls would be removed. The interior courtyard will offer natural light. It will complement the Mission's function.

There were no questions of Mr. Ceslicki,

Mr. Lennon said there were several board members and parents present, in support of this request.

Mr. Anderson was sworn in. This PUD has evolved over time. The Comprehensive Plan suggests office use. There is adequate parking for the proposed use, and hours of operation will be offset from rearby uses.

Audience member, Kathy Amatulli was sworn in. She understands the concept and asked what sources the funding was coming from. Mr. Lengen responded that funds come from donations, they don't rely on State and County funding.

There was nothing further.

Mr. Anderson stated the proposal would operate primarily on the weekends. Many of the surrounding office uses and the adjacent childcare facility operate primarily during the week. Therefore, Staff does not believe there would be conflicts with the surrounding land uses. However, the Comprehensive Plan identifies this property as Office.

Therefore, Staff recommends action at the discretion of the Plan Commission. If the Plan Commission recommends approval of the proposal Staff would recommend the following condition:

August 18, 2015

1. The project shall be operated in a manner that substantially conforms to the attached business operations plan.

Mr. Dwyer asked how long the building has been vacant; 3 or 4 months. The property violations (like parking junk cars in the lot) have been corrected.

Ms. Williams made a motion to close the public hearing, seconded by Mr. Noonan and passed with all ayes.

DELIBERATIONS:

Mr. Dwyer said it would be nice if this was an office use, but this is a good use for the property; Mr. Noonan agreed.

Mr. Hanson asked the Petitioner if he could meet the condition; yes.

Mr. Dwyer summarized that the request had met the standards and was approved by 4 vote of 5-0, it is tentatively scheduled for September 14.
